#### **Going Fishing?**

- Know the rules for where you are fishing Read and understand the regulations.
- Respect private property Ask for permission before going onto someone's property.
- Be respectful to other fishers and help them if they need it.
- Use strong fishing line to land fish quickly.
- Use hooks that can rust out, in case a hook is lost in a fish.
- Use barbless hooks if you intend to release your fish.
- Be respectful of wildlife—Give wildlife the right of way.
- Do not walk behind fishers who are trying to cast. For safety it is recommended to wear protective glasses and a hat.
- Do not destroy plants along the water They provide cover and help keep the water cool.
- Do not litter Keep your fishing area clean. Pick up trash and leave the area cleaner than you found it.
- Always wear your life jacket!





## **Catching Fish**

- Do not crowd other fishers.
- Do not take someone else's spot.
- If you catch a fish, bring it in quickly so you do not exhaust the fish.
- Keep your fish in the water until you know it's a "keeper."
- Avoid bruising—Don't let fish flop around.
- If you intend to harvest your fish, kill it quickly with a sharp blow to the top of the head, and break a gill so it bleeds quickly.
- Know the bag limit, keep only the fish you will use. Release the rest unharmed.
- Keep injured fish unless it is prohibited by size or bag limit regulations.
- **Do not snag** unless you <u>know for</u> <u>certain</u> it is allowed in an area.
- Clean your fish at the river or lake.

### **Releasing a Fish**

- Always:
  - If possible, leave the fish in the water and unhook it without touching it.
  - If landing a fish using a net, use a soft knotless net to surround the fish in the water.
  - Leave the fish in the net and without touching the fish, remove the hook using a hook remover or pliers.
  - Gently remove the hook from the same hole it came through.
  - If you must handle the fish, wet your hands first.
- Reviving Your Catch:
  - Support the fish gently upright in the water, cradling its midsection.
  - Face the fish into the current.
  - Gently move it back and forth.
  - As the fish recovers let it swim freely from your hands.
- Never:
  - Squeeze a fish or rip the hook out.
  - Throw a fish.
  - Put your fingers in the gills or eyes.
  - Pick the fish up by the tail.
  - Let the fish thrash around on the ground.
